DANIELE ANDREOZZI (History Degree cum laude, University of Venice; Ph.D. in European Social History, University of Venice) is Associate Professor of Economic History at the University of Trieste where currently he teaches Economic History and Economic History of Europe. Andreozzi's research interests focus on growth and crisis in the economic systems, the relationship between the trade mechanisms, the social practices, the norms and the institutions and between economic system, identities, memories and borders and the social and economic exchanges and the circulation of goods and men in the Mediterranean area. Prof. Tonolo's research interests currently focus on private international law and human rights, i.e. the assessment of the compatibility of national rules with fundamental rights.
